Lianne Notarandrea

Lianne Notarandrea is an army brat of a very proud Canadian soldier and a stay-at-home mom. Her career was an exceptional experience – for 37 years she worked with developmentally challenged children with severe behavioural issues at CPRI. She is now on the CPRI volunteer board and spends much time with their annual book sale to raise money for the children's special needs. After retirement, she accepted a year's position as nanny to four Orthodox Jewish children, and then a shorter position with a Sikh family. The grandmother of the Indian family tried to teach her the cooking of Indian food – a partially successful experiment – she loved eating it, especially Roti, but not cooking it! As she learned and lived these families' faiths, her own faith was defined and strengthened.

Her passions outside of the CWL include baking, but not cooking - unlike her father, a cook in the military. She is an accomplished geocacher with over 11,000 finds and many hides - so if you are missing anything, she may be to blame or perhaps could find it for you! All that searching and hiking keeps her in shape though she can't go the distances she used to.

Like many cradle Catholics, she wandered from practice in young adulthood but returned after marriage. "My faith journey really started after one of my children had some significant issues. My trying to fix things over and over again was not helping either of us, so I started to pray, study the Bible and did more talking with God rather than at Him for magic wand-waving. Joining prayer groups was so inspiring and I was not judged for all the mistakes I made in this journey, not an easy journey, but the "significant issues" are no longer. Even though my children are not regular church attendees, they are faithful followers and in tough times ask for the prayers of my prayer group." I have two wonderful interesting little twins as grandchildren and I would like to be remembered by them as an example described in Proverbs 31: 10–31.

A word or phrase that sums up Lianne - hard for Lianne to say, but the Newsletter editor says she is incredibly hard-working and dedicated - but watch out for the Italian temper if all the work gets dumped on her! So dear reader, you are warned! By the way, her cakes are to die for!

Rita Macintyre, born in Neerkant, Holland, emigrated to Canada with her family -parents, three older sisters, three younger brothers and a younger sister - in 1952. Now only her brother Frits and herself survive. Though growing up in Woodstock, Rita has been a long term resident of London, working for 45 years with London Life (now Canada Life). Her husband died in 2015 from Parkinson's disease, however, she has the ongoing joy of two children, Melissa and Craig, and four grandchildren, who, along with her friends, are her greatest passion.

Health is also a major interest for her as she is a cancer survivor, however, her health concerns have not held her back from all kinds of community service. Besides volunteering in the CWL and at church functions, she volunteers with Meals on Wheels, the Mission Store, and at two nursing homes. This busy lady is also a member of the Byron Legion Ladies Auxiliary.

It is always amazing and inspiring how much some people pack into life! You may know that Rita is also a quilter extraordinaire and belongs to two local quilting guilds, and often seems to be going off to quilt shows and conferences. Oh, almost forgot, she loves to read, play card games and go to live concerts.

All this is based on her faith life, an important though very private part of her life. What we see is someone whose life motto is "There is always someone worse off than you." and who never feels sorry about herself or her situation.

The legacy that she would like to leave her grandchildren is the strong memory that she was a caring person who was always there for them, in thick and thin.

We are hugely blessed in the presence of these two women in our CWL - they are very much part of the glue that holds us together.
