Books recently added to our collection are marked with an asterisk.

In the library section called “Christian Life,” you will find books that deal with some aspect of the everyday day life of Christians, including some that would probably be found in the psychology section of a public library.

Alcorn, Randy – Money Possessions and Eternity

A comprehensive, Biblically-based examination of how, as Christians and stewards, we should regard our money and possessions, looking at areas such as our modern tendency to live with debt, the increase in gambling, consumerism, and the relationship of money and church support.

Barclay, Michael – Sacred Relationships: Biblical Wisdom for Deepening Our Lives Together

A rabbi looks at several books of the Old Testament, including Ruth, Psalms, Job, and Esther, to find hidden pathways given to a personal encounter with God in the everyday and our relationships with each other.

Bartocci, Barbara – Midlife Awakenings: Discovering the Gifts Life has given Us

On the basis that turning fifty can open for one new ways of praying, of seeing a change in goals and values, of perhaps an entirely new way of living, Bartocci offers short passages on various subjects for meditation.

Bass, Dorothy – Receiving the Day: Christian Practices for Opening the Gift of Time

Recognizing that many of us feel that time is a negative element in our pressured lives, Bass suggests ways of seeing time as a gift of God. Through rediscovery of the Sabbath as a period of freedom and joy and of living fully the cycle of the Christian year, we can become caught up in the story of God in a life-transforming way.

Bertanzetti, Eileen, editor – Padre Pio’s Words of Hope

Short meditations that begin with a Scriptural quotation that is accompanied with an everyday life question, followed by a quotation from the writings of Padre Pio which answers the questions or gives further guidance beyond the Scriptural quotation.

Bridges, William – Transitions: Making Sense of Life’s Changes: Strategies for Coping with the Difficult, Painful, and Confusing Times in Your Life

An examination of critical changes in our lives, focusing on endings as a new start, on a neutral zone which seems like a disconnected time but is really a time of reorientation, and on new beginnings that are the end product of transitions.

Bucka, John – Faithfully Parenting Teens: A Proactive Approach

A series of typical family situations with questions and faith-based suggestions on how to deal with them.

Canfield, Jack et alia – A Cup of Chicken Soup for the Soul

A mini version of the Chicken Soup material with very short inspirational vignettes and illustrations.

Canfield, Jack et alia – A Second Chicken Soup for the Woman's Soul: 101 More Stories to Open the Hearts and Rekindle the Spirits of Women

Another iteration of the Chicken Soup format of short inspiring stories, this time directed to women.

Castine, Jacqueline – Recovery from Rescuing: A Personal Growth Book for Co-dependents, Adult Children of Alcoholics, Workaholics, Health Care Professionals, Enablers... Anyone who is tired of carrying the burden of caring for others

Based on the author's life experience, this is a book of defining one's situation as an enabler/controller and moving from that position to allowing the people around one the option of taking control and responsibility for their lives.

Chervin, Ronda – Feminine, Free, & Faithful

Chervin explores the possibilities of being feminine and yet free to develop fully as a human being, based on teachings of the Church.

Chinnici, Rosemary – Can Women RE-IMAGE the Church?

Growing out of feminist theology and its concerns with perceived patriarchal nature of the Church, this book questions the historical preconceptions of women nature and roles and, based on the stories of four women, suggests ways in which, by contributing their views and actions to their local faith communities, they can change the patriarchal Church.

Chittister, Joan – The Gift of Years: Growing Older Gracefully

A gem of a book for people living in a world of strident emphasis on youth. Chittister encourages the reader to see the benefits of maturation, the opportunities it offers for free expression of care for others, for definition of meaning and significance in one's life. Also addressed are negative areas such as the feeling of rejection that comes from feeling out of the mainstream, the ending of relationships, and the speed of technological change.

Chittister, Joan – Happiness

An interesting exploration of what happiness has been defined by others, what it is for each of us and how it creates the trajectory of our lives. As "happiness creatures in search of ourselves" happiness saturates our valuation of our lives, focuses us on what is important and what we are neglecting that would be a blessing to us.

*Chittister, Joan – The Monastic Heart: 50 Simple Practices for a Contemplative and Fulfilling Life

A very interesting book on various aspects of Benedictine monasticism and their applicability to lay life.

Chittister, Joan – The Way We Were: A Story of Conversion and Renewal

Based on the experiences of the Benedictine nuns of Erie in the process of renewal of religious life after Vatican II, this book is a study in the way change happens that exemplifies for the wider church how to redefine basic faith when non-essential ways or processes are found wanting or not useful.

Clarke, Bill – The Face of Friendship: a True Story of Hope and Transformation

A moving story of friendship between a priest and a much-battered addict in a L'Arche-like setting on an Ontario farm started by the Jesuits as a sanctuary for persons coming out of jail or psychiatric facilities.

Cliffe, Albert – Let Go and Let God: Steps in Victorious Living

Based on the life-changing experience of acceptance of Christ as one's savior, the author examines ten steps in letting go of various fears and maladjustments, and the putting of oneself totally into the hands of God. Originally published in 1951, the book has a somewhat dated feel and the tone is quite evangelical.

Cloud, Henry and John Townsend – Boundaries: When to Say YES, When to Say NO, To Take Control of Your Life

Biblically based boundaries, what they are, what conflicts are caused by having or not having them, and how to develop healthy boundaries that give you the freedom to become what God wishes for you.

Coffey, Kathy – The Best of Being Catholic

While aware of the many negative aspects of the institutional church, Coffey explores the joy of what Catholics believe, the seasons celebrated and the people who make up the Church.

Cox, Harvey – The Seduction of the Spirit: The Use and Misuse of People's Religion

Some serious sociological analysis of the present state of mass media culture and reduction of religion to a narrow concept, through the concepts of stories and signals.

Curran, Dolores – In the Beginning There Were the Parents

Though published in 1978, this humorous book still has some relevance in our rather different world, offering encouragement to parents as the primary religious educators of their children and source of behavior norms for them.

*Cybulskie, Daniele – How to Live like a Monk: Medieval Wisdom for Modern Life

A charming and wise book with lovely vignettes of medieval manuscript illustrations on applying the lifestyle of monasticism to a secular existence today.

Davitz, Lois and Joel Davitz – Parenting Teenagers: 20 Tough Questions and Answers

Suggestions for such questions as communication, establishing close relationships, rebellion against religion, sex, drugs and alcohol.

DeBlassie, Paul – Inner Calm: a Christian Answer to Modern Stress

Based on the insights of modern psychology and Christianity, the author offers some useful practical approaches to dealing with stress, particularly using the practice of the repetition of the name of Jesus.

Donders, Joseph – Charged with the Spirit: Mission is for Everyone

Donders explores the sharing of the Spirit of Jesus so that our church communities become sacraments of Jesus' presence in the world. The intention of the book is to be a workbook for believers to reflect on, discuss and act upon.

Enzler, Clarence – My Other Self: Conversations with Christ on Living Your Faith

Modeled on Thomas a Kempis' *Imitation of Christ*, this book presents daily conversations with Christ speaking to the reader as "my other self," guiding the reader to become an *alter Christus* in service to others.

*Epperly, Bruce – Walking with Francis of Assisi: From Privilege to Activism

A series of meditations on the life and teachings of St. Francis on privilege, prayer and social justice, calling for us to apply what we see in Francis to our world of human and climatic problems, in the gross and growing disparity between the privileged and the poor.

Faucett, Robert and Carol – Personality and Spiritual Freedom: Growing in the Christian Life through Understanding Personality Type and the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator

The book explains the Myers-Briggs approach to personality description and suggests how this approach can enrich one's interpersonal relationships and how it can suggest fruitful methods of prayer and spirituality.

Fiand, Barbara – Where Two or Three are Gathered: Community Life for the Contemporary Religious

A look at amending the seemingly uninspired communal life of present religious, a problem because it underlies the whole enterprise of dedicated religious life.

Fiand, Barbara – Wrestling with God: Religious Life in Search of its Soul

Fiand feels that religious life at present, despite an obvious need for change, suffers from a timidity about making large changes in the way that charism is expressed. The book looks at the

need to embrace free thinking and a new commitment to love and intimacy, of a need for “participatory consciousness” that can break comfortable molds.

*Francis, Pope – Gaudete et Exsultate: On the call to Holiness in Today’s World

Francis says this is a re-proposed call to holiness in a practical way for our times. He explores God’s call to each to grow in holiness, following Christ in community and constant prayer. Holiness is characterized by perseverance, patience, joy and a sense of humor, and can flourish despite the surrounding contemporary ethos of private privileged intellectualism and emphasis on individual will.

Francis, Pope – The Joy of the Gospel

An extended look at the Gospel call to all the faithful to be missionaries for Jesus. The book explores the themes of call and witness that has been part of St. George’s parish development programme in recent years. He talks of the need to be committed to the church community in order to grow in love and the need to witness in the wider community through social justice.

Francis, Pope – The Joy of Love: on Love in the Family

An extended letter to both clerical and lay faithful on the nature of the family. He looks at challenges facing families today, the vocation of marriage, what love means in marriage and what needs to be done to support families so they can be sources of love for the wider community,

Froehlich, Mary Ann – When You’re Facing the Empty Nest: Avoiding Midlife Meltdown when Your Child Leaves Home

Tips for weathering an event that can herald major life questions and changes in one’s self-concept and one’s relationship with one’s spouse, and with one’s children.

*Gardner, Gary – The Earth Cries Out: How Faith Communities Meet the Challenges of Sustainability

A very inspiring book that looks at twelve examples of faith communities confronting our present problems of climate change and its effects on us in such areas as food security for the poor. Based on Pope Francis’ Laudato Si’, Gardner offers positive hope for sustainability and respectful use of creation.

Gentles, Ian, editor – A Time to Choose Life: Women, Abortion and Human Rights

A series of essays from a pro-life stance on the ideological issues of on-demand abortion, the medical implications and consequences of abortion and the various legal decisions made in Canada allowing liberal access to abortion.

Grassi, Dominic – Bumping into God again: 35 More Stories of Finding Grace in Unexpected Places

A warm, “feel good” book of ordinary incidents in Grassi’s life and experience that are opportunities to see the finger of God, sometimes a subtle hint, other times more obviously graced moments.

Gustin, Marilyn – The Courage to Change: Empowering Your Life from the Inside out: A Spiritual Guide for Women

A book about inner choices that can determine one’s life despite what external factors may be present. The ability to choose is based on a healthy understanding of the personal gifts and talents that God has given one.

Hamilton, Scott – The Great Eight: How to be Happy (even when you have every reason to be miserable)

Based on his experience as a champion skater and the two-time cancer survivor, Hamilton credits his happiness to faith and a can-do attitude, looking at life in both terms of challenge and acceptance.

Hahn, Scott – First Comes Love: Finding Your Family in the Church and the Trinity

Hahn explores the metaphor of family in religious terms, that is, in the nature of God Himself and in our relationship with one another in the Church, and how this is related to our human experience of family.

Hanes, Mari – Nine Months to a Miracle: Spiritual Preparation for Moms-to-be

Hanes takes the reader through the nine months of pregnancy, addressing the emotional and spiritual aspects of the time, tying them to the development stages of the child and embedding the experience within the matrix of God and His love. A calming and supportive book for women who often live far from supporting relatives.

Harley, Willard – Defending Traditional Marriage: It Starts with You

Harley defines marriage in traditional terms (one man and one woman till death) which are very much under attack in modern society. He then shows ways of defending marriages to safeguard the stability and safety they offer – all boiling down to the circular operation of love.

Harmer, Catherine – Religious Life in the 21st Century: A Contemporary Journey into Canaan

Harmer defines some disturbing trends in current religious life which seems to have become very self-centered and she examines key cultural and religious paradigm shifts that are necessary if dedicated religious life is to flourish in our time. Using the metaphor of the Exodus, she sees the need for religious to boldly venture into new expressions of their charism.

Harris, Maria – Jubilee Time: Celebrating Women, Spirit, and the Advent of Age

Looking at the new possibilities and opportunities for service and self-expression open to older women, Harris offers guided meditations and exercises and the testimonies of contemporary older women to assist in spiritual transformation

He's Alive! Personal Stories of Faith, Conversion and Renewal, volumes 1 and 2

A wide variety of people tell their stories followed by questions for reflection.

Hermes, Kathryn – Surviving Depression: A Catholic Approach

With encouraging accounts of others who have lived with depression and from her own experience, Hermes explores how to deal with depression from both a psychological/medical and a Christian basis. There are suggestions for practical action by the sufferer and by those around them, prayers and meditations that can be used, and an eight-step program to gain inner peace.

Hungering and Thirsting for Justice: Real-life Stories by Young Adult Catholics, edited by Louwagie & Ward

Moving stories by American Catholics on their personal conversion on controversial matters of Christian morality and action, such as the death penalty, race relations, and homosexuality.

I like being Catholic: Treasured Traditions, Rituals, and Stories

A feel-good collection of personal experiences and memories by a wide variety of Catholic writers on their positive feelings of being Catholic.

Johnson, Richard – The 12 Keys to Spiritual Vitality: Powerful Lessons on Living Agelessly

Thoughts from a gerontological counsellor on necessary steps to a fullness of life and maturity in God: connection with others, forgiveness of self and others, living in the moment, letting go of anger, and so on.

Kane, Thomas – The Healing Touch of Affirmation

A book on the psychic/social need for affirmation **from** others through their love in order to offer life-giving affirmation **to** others in order that they can also grow as God intends.

Kelly, Matthew – The Biggest Lie in the History of Christianity

A popular analysis of the assumptions of modern North American culture. These pose a challenge to Christians because they attack our basic beliefs in God's presence in history, our need for Christ, and our goal of holiness and union with God. Kelly writes of the effects of cultural absorption in our comfortable, though perhaps unconscious, refusal to allow God to transform our lives into "something beautiful" for Him.

*Kelly, Matthew – Life is Messy

Coming from his own life experience, Kelly talks of the universal problem of life being messy, cracked, and not what we might have planned. He talks of how to embrace that messiness and use it to progress to a fuller life.

Kelly, Matthew – Rediscover Jesus: An Invitation

A collection of short stories or meditations that pose questions about Jesus and our relationship with him. After each story, Kelly gives the reader a point to ponder, a verse from the Bible to consider, a question about one's life, and a short prayer arising from these. They are designed to deepen one's connection to Jesus.

Kelly, Matthew – Resisting Happiness

As the cover says, this is a true story about why we sabotage ourselves, feel overwhelmed, set aside our dreams, and lack the courage to simply be ourselves...and how to start choosing happiness again.

Kelsey, Morton – Psychology, Medicine & Christian Healing

An examination by an Anglican minister, himself a healer, of the history and nature of Christian healing from Jesus on to modern times with reference to the supporting understanding of healing found in the work of Jung.

King, Pat – Help for Women with Too Much to Do

Sharing personal stories of stress and burnout caused by too much activity and the drain of non-appreciation by family and co-workers, King suggests coping through changing things that are in one's control – one's lifestyle, outlook and expectations.

Laney, Marti – The Introvert Advantage: How to Thrive in an Extrovert World

Tips, coping mechanisms, and tactics for energy management for introverts working with their temperament in areas such as relationships, parenting, socializing, and the work environment.

Lepp, Ignace – Love Builds Mankind: A Great Psychiatrist's Final Testament to His Readers

A series of essays undergirded by the principle of the need for the taking of adult individual responsibility for actions and decisions, particularly in an environment of rapid change and challenge to traditional morality.

Linamen, Karen – Welcome to the Funny Farm: The All-true Misadventures of a Woman on the Edge

Humorous columns from women-of-faith.com on women's lives all lightened by the fact that God cares about all aspects of our lives, bizarre or otherwise.

Lavoie, Sylvain – Drumming from Within: Tales of Hope and Faith from Canada's North

The story of life and spiritual growth from new priest to Archbishop in service to the Indigenous people of northern Manitoba and Saskatchewan that sheds a positive light on the service of the Oblates to their chosen people.

Leddy, Mary Jo – Say to the Darkness, We Beg to Differ

A selection of Leddy's writings in the late 70s and 80s about social justice matters that challenged the Church and humanity with choices between being overwhelmed in one's silence by the dark side of life and embracing fully the need to witness to the light.

Loder, Ted – The Haunt of Grace: Responses to the Mystery of God's Presence

Selections from sermons on the theme of the mystery in life's events that keeps us from mediocre settling and keeps us restless for God in response to this manifestation of God's grace.

Lowery, Daniel – Following Christ: How to Live a Moral Life

Drawing on the Bible, Vatican II, John Paul II, and letters from the American Conference of Bishops, the author examines the basis of Christian morality. He looks at traditional themes such as God's love for us and human freedom. He also deals with current problems like sexuality, medical ethics, and justice. Some readers may find the book too prescriptive and traditional in stance.

Lukefahr, Oscar – The Search for Happiness: Four levels of Emotional and Spiritual Growth

Lukefahr examines four levels of happiness, all of which but the final are inadequate to the desire of humans for ongoing happiness. On the lowest level, there is gratification of bodily sensations, then the achievement of personal success and the approval of others. On the third level we seek happiness in serving others and in our relationships with other, and lastly, the only source of happiness which is not passing and vulnerable to change is friendship with God.

Lustiger, Jean-Marie, Cardinal – The Promise

A book growing out of the renewal of relations between Jews and Catholics fostered by John Paul II. It explores the nature of the relationship of Jesus and the early Church towards their roots in Judaism and the fulfillment that Jesus is of God's promises to His chosen people.

Macomber, Debbie – One Simple Act: Discovering the Power of Generosity

Meditations on generosity with stories of acts of generosity and their consequences. A feel-good book.

McDowell, Lucinda – Quilts from Heaven: Finding Parables in the Patchwork of Life

Quilt patches and patterns as a metaphor for women's lives – a feel-good read for women.

McGeady, Mary – Sometimes God Has a Kid's Face

Moving stories of the street children that were rescued by the Covenant House movement lead for some years by the author.

McMakin, Jacqueline – Working from the Heart: For Those who Hunger for Meaning and Satisfaction in their Work

A book offering guidance in defining one's gifts, one's need for establishing meaning in one's life, practical considerations in choosing a vocation, and characteristics of the work environment needed.

Muller, Wayne – Sabbath: Finding Rest, Renewal, and Delight in our Busy Lives

An interesting exploration of the need for rest, for non-busyness, in order to be truly human, humane and centered in God, summed up in observance of the Sabbath.

Murphy, James – 17 Steps toward Better Communication with Your Teen

Short tips on making matters between family members clearer and more open to positive growth. Self-tests help parents to see better where they are coming from and how they can influence the reactions of others.

Muto, Susan – Late Have I Loved Thee: The Recovery of Intimacy

An exploration of everyday intimacy that gives us a deeper meaning to life and enables our relationship with God, helping us to move beyond a lonely sterile individualism.

*Naughton, Michael – Getting Work Right: Labor and Leisure in a Fragmented World

A very interesting book on the need to transform our work world from the emphasis on profit to an emphasis on human dignity based on a balance between the revivifying observance of Sunday as rest in God and work that promotes the good development of both the worker and the world.

*Nouwen, Henri – Community

A selection of both unpublished writing and published articles which give a picture of Nouwen's understanding of community as a necessary part of one's spiritual life, requiring much effort on the part of the participants in response to God's call to live together.

Packer, Anne – A Matter of Conscience

A Canadian story of a policeman who refused orders to guard Morgentaler's abortion clinic as a statement of conscience.

Parsons, Rob – The Sixty Minute Marriage Builder

A selection of short essays, all readable in an hour total, on aspects of marriage such as communication, finances, and warming up one's love life.

Peterson, Wilferd – More about the Art of Living

Very short essays on various aspects of life as stimulants to further thought.

Popcak, Gregory – A Catholic Guide to Lifelong Marriage

Based on a combination of clinical counselling and personal experience with Christianity, the author describes exceptional marriages built on relationship skills and life experience, both of which one can be taught.

Powell, John – Why am I Afraid to Tell You Who I am

Powell looks at the different levels of communication between people and how they help to define the depth of relationship that we are willing to commit to in that relationship. He discusses the various personae that we adopt to show the world and their effects on our authenticity and personal growth.

Raby, Tom – The Little World of Fr. Raby 1980-2007

Collected material from *The Catholic Register* of material by Raby on parish life, a final sequel to two previous collections of his anecdotes and reflections.

Reilly, Christopher – Making Your Marriage Work: Growing in Love after Falling in Love

Part one deals with our beliefs about marriage and the second part explores basic skills of communication, accommodation and acceptance that enable growth in a marriage.

Remen, Rachel – Kitchen Table Wisdom: Stories that Heal

True stories that illustrate the human spirit that can enable winning over great challenges like physical illness and aging.

Rich, Ronda – What Southern Women Know about Faith: Kitchen Table Stories and Back Porch Comfort

Stories that illustrate evangelical Christian faith with a somewhat sentimental Southern States setting.

Richo, David – Coming Home to Who You are: Discovering Your Natural Capacity for Love, Integrity, and Compassion

Based on Jungian psychology and Buddhist philosophy, Richo offers this manual on how to nurture the best in ourselves and our relationships by nurturing ourselves in a truthful assessment of ourselves, cultivating our integrity, being with others in an increasingly intimate way, and reaching out in compassion to the world.

Rusk, Tom – Mind Traps: Change Your Mind Change Your Life

Rusk defines several mental habits that sabotage people's development and happiness, such as fear of change, failure, and rejection, self-blame and perfectionism. He offers a self-change program to correct these unhelpful mental habits.

Ryan, Michael – The Social Attitudes of a Catholic

Written by a priest of our diocese, this is an easy-reading exploration of a wide range of social justice topics, including such areas as the handling of money, immigration, refugees, ecology and work.

St. Romain, Philip & Lisa Bellecci-St. Romain - Living Together, Loving Together: A Spiritual Guide to Marriage

A waterfront coverage of all aspects of marriage from premarital communication of values and expectations to marriage's sacramental nature to dealing with the challenges of marriage around money, children and stress.

Scanlan, Michael – What Does God Want? A Practical Guide to Making Decisions

Guidance for making both small and large decisions, judging options on the basis of five characteristics: conformity with God's known will, contribution to the ongoing conversion of one's heart, the consistency of the decisions with past events in one's life, confirmation by ensuing events, and the level of conviction one has about the rightness of the decision.

Schmitz, Michael – Made for Love: Same-sex Attractions and the Catholic Church

A book written in the same clear, down-to-earth style of Fr. Schmitz' Internet videos, this is a very approachable book on a topic of current interest. With compassion for the person, but also a clear understanding of the call for all Christians to chastity, Schmitz lays out the Church's position on orientation to, and the practice of, homosexuality.

*Schumacher, E.F. – A Guide for the Perplexed

The author of Small is Beautiful presents a critique of the "materialistic scientism" that he sees prevailing today and which diminishes man to a collection of mindless mechanistic atoms. He posits a larger Christian view which inspires us to develop our goals and a life of higher significance. "Our ordinary mind always tries to persuade us that we are nothing but acorns, but that is of interest only to pigs. Our faith gives us something much better: that we can become oak trees."

Shannon, William – Seeds of Peace: Contemplation and Non-violence

Shannon looks at the difficulties that people have bringing peace to their lives, relationships and their society. He suggests that a deep interiority of life is necessary to achieve peace. Contemplation, he suggests, can produce a oneness with God that will, as a by-product, create love and non-violence.

Sider, Ronald – Rich Christians in an Age of Hunger: A Biblical Study

An older book but still relevant in its call for us to recognize the problems of massive hunger and poverty in much of the world, the stance of the Bible on these matters, and the changes needed in our lifestyle to address the problems.

*Smith, Janet and Christopher Kaczor – Life Issues, Medical Choices: Questions and Answers for Catholics

A useful book informing Catholics in clear language on where the lines are drawn for Catholics on beginning-of-life issues, such as reproductive technologies and family planning, and on end-of-life issues. It also looks at wider matters such as respect for the human body, the authority of the Church, and co-operation with evil.

Snyder, John – Marrying for Life: The Challenge of Creating a Lasting Friendship

Written by a local author, this book stresses the need for serious premarital work in communicating between each partner on values and expectations, and then ongoing need for communication in dealing with problems that normally arise in marriage such as resolving conflicts, money and raising children.

Stepien, Chris – Dying to be Happy: Discovering the Truth about Life

An easy-reading exploration of how to respond to our uncertain in timing but certain in happening death. In preparation Stepien suggests living like Christ, showing mercy and using earthly possessions in love in order to secure real wealth in heaven.

Stories for the Heart: Over 100 Stories Celebrating Friends, Family, and Love

A feel-good book particularly for women.

Ternier-Gommers, Marie-Louise – Finding the Treasure Within: A Woman's Journey into Preaching

The autobiography of a Catholic woman, trained in a Lutheran seminary, expresses her call to liturgical preaching.

Vanstone, W.H. – Fare Well in Christ

Vogels, Walter – Becoming Fully Human: A Biblical Perspective

Rather than reading the Bible as a series of disconnected quotations to support a particular viewpoint, Vogels suggests a broader view in which the whole Bible becomes normative for the believer and the basic message is that we are called to be open to God, to have solidarity with others and to have respect for nature.

West, Christopher – Good News about Sex & Marriage: Answers to Your Honest Questions about Catholic Teaching
